This Action Plan is an expanded version of the Action Plan in response to Hurricane Oscar (October 20), now incorporating both Hurricane Rafael (November 6) and the earthquakes (November 10)

and seeks **\$78.3** million to support nearly **930K** people with their most urgent needs and recovery activities.

Situation overview


In the span of just 20 days, two hurricanes and two earthquakes hit Cuban territory, within the context of an energy emergency that disconnected the national electric system on 18 October, two days before the impact of the first hurricane.

On 20 October, Hurricane Oscar made landfall as a Category 1 in the eastern part of Cuba, Guantánamo province. The system generated winds of more than 130 km/h, with significant rainfall accumulations, causing severe flooding in territories that usually face the challenges of drought. Its devastating path through the eastern region affected nearly half a million people, of which about 150,000 suffered critical damage. Eight people were reported dead.

A few days later, on 6 November, Hurricane Rafael made landfall on Artemisa, already a Category 3 hurricane. A population of 3.5 million in four provinces in the west of the country was exposed to very strong gusts and heavy rains. Approximately 800,000 people have suffered the damages caused by this powerful hurricane in the most exposed territories of Artemisa, Mayabeque, Havana and Isla de la Juventud.

Added to this, two strong earthquakes – one of 6 degrees and another of 6.7 on the Richter scale, with multiple aftershocks– impacted eastern Cuba on 10 November, in particular the provinces of Granma and Santiago de Cuba, causing damage to homes and key infrastructure.

In less than a month, the country has been hit by three disasters of diverse nature which impacted different regions of the Cuban archipelago, with significant negative effects in key sectors for the well-being of the population, their livelihoods and socio-economic development, reaching seven provinces and 17 municipalities of the country.



Most urgent needs

Hundreds of thousands of people have lost their belongings and basic necessities, including food, cooking equipment, water storage containers, hygiene products, mattresses, and household appliances as a result of the three disasters that have hit Cuba in the last three weeks. So far, preliminary assessments indicate that more than 46,000 homes have suffered significant damage, in addition to service facilities. It is estimated that this number could continue to increase as the quantification of damage in the territories progresses. Damage to vital community services facilities such as health institutions, food distribution centers, water supply, sanitation services, warehouses, pharmacies and schools are also identified. Agriculture and food processing facilities have been severely damaged, making access to food and people's livelihoods more difficult.

Preliminary damage is recorded in more than 200 public health facilities in 17 municipalities in 7 of the 15 provinces of the country, including 28 general hospitals, polyclinics, family doctor's offices and pharmacies with impacts on essential medical equipment and maternal and child program services, among others. The present situation significantly increases the risk of disease outbreaks, in particular arboviruses. Guantánamo, impacted by Hurricane Oscar, had been identified by health authorities as one of the territories with the highest levels of vector infestation, in a national context of high prevalence of dengue and Oropouche fever. The impact on water services has affected more than 750,000 people in the provinces of Artemisa and Havana.

In more than 40% of the educational centers in the most affected municipalities, total and partial damage has been identified, including impact on school furniture and loss of school materials (books, notebooks, school supplies and others) and, in particular, many damages to roofs, which jeopardize the resumption of teaching activities.

More than 37,000 hectares of land dedicated to agricultural production were affected, with heavy losses of food crops. In addition, the storage, cooking and food preservation capacities of households and institutions, including those that support social safety nets, have been affected. In Guantánamo, half of the salt production in the municipality of San Antonio del Sur and almost all coffee crops in the affected territories, both fundamental livelihoods of the inhabitants of the area were destroyed, which could add challenges in terms of employment and economic support for the families. Artemisa and Mayabeque, territories that supply food to 2 million people in the capital, have been devastated with critical damage to basic crops such as bananas, cassava and sweet potatoes and to poultry farms and food stores.

The damage to the national electro-energy system has directly affected the water supply, in addition to a severe impact on water infrastructure and the loss of tanks and water collection and distribution systems in homes and institutions. Breaks in hydraulic systems and roads cause serious limitations to access to safe water and sanitation in these territories, vital services for survival and prevention of outbreaks of diseases of water-sanitary and vector origin. In addition, families have lost their personal hygiene supplies, limiting the ability to prevent diseases.

The impact of these consecutive emergencies comes at a time when the country is facing a very complex energy situation due to the deterioration of its electricity infrastructure and fuel shortages, in a context of unilateral external sanctions. At the time of the impact of Hurricane Oscar, authorities were working to restore their national electrical power system, the disconnection of which had caused disruptions to basic services, including access to drinking water, sanitation and food preservation, and Hurricane Rafael caused a new disconnection of the National System that made the emergency response more complex. National efforts have been immediate to rescue and care for those affected. However, the damage is devastating. Accompanying national authorities in efforts to protect vulnerable groups and restore essential services that continue in difficult and/or suspended conditions is urgently required. Due to unilateral external sanctions, Cuba is excluded from major international financial institutions and faces extremely limited access to international capital markets, making it extremely difficult to finance disaster response and development. In the face of the destructive impact of simultaneous emergencies, it is critical to accompany Cuba in its ongoing response and recovery efforts.

Response from national authorities

As part of the Civil Defense System, national and local authorities had to respond, in a period of just 20 days, to the impact of two hurricanes and several earthquakes, implementing the protocols planned to avoid human and material losses. In total, some 400,000 people were protected, mostly in the homes of family and friends, within a context of energy emergency that made prevention and response actions complex.

Prior to the hit of the hurricanes, priority was given to the transfer of power generators to vital centers, the distribution of coal for cooking, the allocation of liquefied gas reserves to health institutions and evacuation centers, as well as the strengthening of storage conditions to preserve goods. Currently, immediate recovery efforts prioritize the restoration of basic services such as electricity and water supply, with the most complex situation in Artemisa, a territory that suffered the greatest impacts of Hurricane Rafael. In the provinces of Granma and Santiago de Cuba, hit by the earthquakes, access to electricity and drinking water is already provided normally.

The telecommunications sector has regained the vitality of much of the fixed and mobile telephony. On the other hand, access to isolated territories has been possible, thanks to the integrated work of institutions, civil society organizations and the communities themselves in the recovery of roads, bridges and damaged electrical infrastructure.

In order to improve the living conditions of the affected families, local governments distribute supplies such as tarpaulins, mattresses and hygiene kits, among other aids, which are delivered free of charge, or through subsidies and bonuses, to the most vulnerable families. In the case of Granma, the province most affected by the earthquakes, tents and a field hospital were installed to protect people from the possibility of collapses in high-rise buildings and health institutions.

In addition to the efforts of the national authorities, contributions have been made by the European Union, Canada, China, Vietnam, Russia and Latin American countries such as Venezuela, Bolivia, Colombia and Mexico, among others.

Given the nature of the disaster, which exceeded all forecasts of damage it is necessary to support the ongoing efforts of this national response.

Response of the United Nations system

The United Nations System (UNS) in Cuba immediately supports national efforts with supplies prepositioned in the country, such as food, tarpaulins, roofs, water tanks, a water treatment plant, hygiene kits, lighting towers with generators, tents for temporary facilities and operations management posts, kitchen kits, mobile warehouses and pallets for the correct storage of food, medical supplies kits, school supplies (WFP, UNDP, UNFPA, UNICEF), and other essential items and medicines that have been arriving immediately to the country (UNHCR, PAHO/ WHO, UNDP, UNICEF).

The United Nations Office for Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) has approved two Emergency Cash Grants that provide rapid financing for the purchase of essential goods in immediate response to each hurricane. On October 30, the Acting Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator approved a \$3.5 million contribution from the United Nations Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) for the immediate response of the United Nations System to the most urgent needs in the affected areas. A new application is currently being submitted to CERF for the response to Hurricane Rafael. Several UN agencies (UNHCR, FAO, IOM, PAHO/ WHO, WFP, UNDP, UNFPA, UNICEF) have activated their internal emergency response mechanisms, are mobilizing their own resources or are redirecting existing funds.

This Plan of Action of the United Nations System is an extension of the Plan of Action in response to Hurricane Oscar (20 October), now including both Hurricane Rafael (6 November) and the earthquakes (10 November). This plan has been prepared in dialogue with the national authorities and includes the system's response to the severe effects caused by these three disasters and in support of the most affected people and territories.

This plan is available to all members of the international community who wish to join this response. Efforts are being coordinated with the European Union, Canada, Switzerland and Chile, which have already contributed to the plan, and efforts are being made to coordinate actions with other actors such as international civil society organizations, including the Red Cross and its international response mechanisms, and CARE, among others. All organizations are invited to report their activities through the 345W platform, with the aim of reducing duplication of efforts and managing an effective response in support of the national authorities.

Strategic objectives

This Action Plan includes projects that address immediate response aspects and will be implemented during the initial six months. Additionally, several projects will continue for an 18-month period, strengthening the transition towards recovery.

Strategic Objectives:

- Support national immediate response actions and the vitality of basic services in critical sectors, with priority given to population groups at risk of vulnerability.
- 2. Support initial early recovery efforts, as well as the reactivation of livelihoods in the most affected territories.

The sectors prioritized for this response are the following:

- Water, Sanitation and Hygiene
- Temporary Shelters, Housing, and Early Recovery
- Education
- Logistics
- Health
- Food Security and Nutrition

To support the monitoring of the Action Plan, a specific project is included to strengthen Coordination during the first six months of implementation.





Targeted population by response sector




Funding required by response sector (USD)

Cuba | Chronology October and November 2024



In 20 days, two hurricanes and two earthquakes hit Cuba in a complex energy context, impacting its population mainly in housing, water, health, food security and education. The challenges in energy supply and fuel availability are across all sectors.

Water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH)



TARGETED POPULATION

459,652 people **1,385,190** people served through Early Recovery

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Impact

WASH services are essential for human survival and for the prevention of outbreaks of water-sanitary and vector-borne diseases, which affect all people, with a more acute impact on children. The effects on the water supply in the provinces most affected by Oscar and Rafael are severe, with losses of infrastructure, damage to pumping equipment, storage media, and the pipelines of the supply systems. The water supply by tanker trucks has been activated for communities where service has been interrupted, as well as highpressure sanitation trucks. At the household level, due to the floods, families lost basic supplies for water storage and treatment, as well as their personal hygiene items.

Following hurricanes Oscar and Rafael, 152,000 people suffered serious damage to their homes, including damage to their domestic sanitation infrastructure. Educational and health institutions have suffered severe damage to their water, sanitation and hygiene infrastructures. With flood waters receding and the impact of high winds, it is critical to ensure sanitary and environmental conditions, with appropriate waste management, treatment and disposal. Needs for equipment and supplies for high-pressure and septic tank cleaning trucks have been identified. Furthermore, ensuring safe sanitation conditions at the household and institutional levels is essential to ensure the health of those affected. FUNDING REQUIRED BY THE SECTOR (USD)

According to authorities from the National Institute of Water Resources, the failure of the national electroenergy system paralyzed 84% of the country's water pumping stations. Only 16% remained in operation, 611 pumps with solar panels and 70 systems supplied by gravity. More than 3 million inhabitants were affected without water service in the country, including a strong impact on the country's capital. Following Hurricane Rafael, severe damage to the electrical system caused the water supply to be affected in the western provinces. A week after the impact, in the province of Artemisa, only 17% of the inhabitants had recovered the water supply service and in Havana, only 20%. In Mayabeque, the interruption of electricity service and water pumping continued in the municipalities of Batabanó, Quivicán, Melena del Sur and Nueva Paz.

The impact of the earthquake in the province of Granma has caused damage to more than 3,500 homes, so part of that population remains outside their homes, and has had to be assisted with the delivery of drinking water and tanks to store it.

The national authorities have activated the delivery of water service by water trucks and community access points.

Priority activities of the sector

- Provide safe drinking water at the household, community and institutional (educational and health) levels, contributing to the prevention and control of waterborne and other vector-borne diseases, with a focus on sustainability and climate resilience in the face of upcoming emergency scenarios.
- Provide sanitation services for affected people at the household, community and institutional levels, ensuring safe waste management, preventing disease and environmental and water source contamination.
- Promote hygiene and community mobilization for healthy practices at the household level, as well as environmental cleaning, ensuring community sanitary and hygienic conditions that prevent outbreaks of water-borne and vector-borne diseases.
- Provide WASH supplies such as hygiene kits that include household water storage and treatment, soap for personal hygiene, menstrual hygiene supplies for girls and women, among other key supplies.

Temporary shelters, Housing and Early recovery

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Impact

Hurricane Oscar has left nearly 60,000 people affected by various damages to their homes: total and partial collapses, as well as the total or partial loss of roofs. Around 90,000 people, including those whose homes were damaged, have lost basic living and subsistence needs such as mattresses, cooking facilities, hygiene, and lack of electricity due to the impact of the floods. The impact of the floods has been greatest in Imías (which is still cut off) and in San Antonio del Sur municipalities.

In addition, damage has been reported at the Fuerte Matachín Municipal Museum - an 18th century Spanish FUNDING REQUIRED BY THE SECTOR (USD)



fortress and the "Cecilio Gómez Lambert" Cultural Center in Baracoa (a heritage building from the late 19th century).

The impact of Hurricane Rafael has so far left (damage is still quantified), some 25,471 homes with various damages, concentrating its impact in the province of Artemisa with more than 83% of the damage. Severe effects predominate considering the ravages of strong category 3 winds. As a result, some 92,000 victims have been identified. At the same time, around 60,000 people (20,000 families) have been identified with severe problems in accessing electricity; they have had coverage with small photovoltaic systems as an immediate alternative, among others to access water. At the same time, damage to the conventional power grid has affected an additional 305,000 people.

Meanwhile, the earthquake in the eastern area has caused structural damage to more than 11,540 homes, affecting more than 46,000 people, in addition to damage to the conventional electricity service network.

The effects of Hurricanes Oscar, Rafael and the earthquake (in the eastern area) have impacted more than 218,700 people, only in the housing sector.

The housing and electrical infrastructure sectors demand considerable resources. In the case of housing, construction materials are scarce in the market due to the limited domestic production of cement, steel, aggregates, etc. For its part, the electrical infrastructure depends on equipment and parts that must be imported, such as transformers, cables, etc., for the most part. Hence, one alternative is to opt for Renewable Energy Sources (RES).

Priority activities of the sector

Immediate response

- Create minimum temporary shelter conditions for affected populations, prioritizing women and vulnerable groups, through temporary facilities and shelter housing in the affected homes, as well as in shelters.
- Promote activities in these temporary shelter spaces for the protection of vulnerable groups and the prevention of Gender-Based Violence (GBV).
- Create basic living conditions/basic life kits, such as mattresses, means for consuming food and safe water, sets of sheets, towels, mosquito nets, solar lamps, hygiene kits, etc. to complement the conditions in shelter solutions, as well as in homes that lost property due to flooding and for people protected in shelters and in the homes of families, friends and neighbors.
- Improve access to electricity through FRE with small photovoltaic systems, other alternative sources, rechargeable lamps, etc. At the same time contribute to the recovery of the electricity supply through the conventional network and electric generators.

Early Recovery

- Create safe living conditions in the homes of affected populations by improving the immediate shelter solutions created in the immediate response, prioritizing vulnerable groups and women, with safe roofs and strengthening brigades with reconstruction resources, as well as technical advice and procedures for the population, ensuring the preparation of workers and technicians.
- Strengthen the local production of construction materials, using local resources (clays, ridges, woods, etc.) and recycling, and transferring appropriate technologies; as well as transferring construction techniques with local resources that allow a rapid response.

- Recover and revitalize the meteorological and hydrological (MH) Early Warning System, reestablishing MH surveillance systems, communications and timely warning to the population, as well as strengthening the Risk Management capacities of Governments and key actors in vulnerable municipalities.
- Support the revitalization of energy solutions to maintain the vitality of basic community services in the affected municipalities, prioritizing the installation of FRE, in housing and services, and supporting the acquisition of prioritized equipment and parts to repair the conventional electricity network.
- Conduct a Post-Disaster Needs Assessment (PDNA) on the effects, impact and existing needs on cultural institutions, natural and cultural heritage and cultural professionals of the affected territories.

Education

Impact

Ministry of Education assessments indicate that at least 484 educational institutions were affected by hurricanes Oscar, Rafael and the 6.7 Richter scale earthquakes, the latter in the province of Granma.

These effects are concentrated in Baracoa, San Antonio del Sur, Maisí and Imías of the province of Guantánamo; Artemisa, San Antonio de los Baños, Alquizar, Güira, Mariel, Bahia Honda and Guanajay of the province of Artemisa; Batabanó, Quivicán and Bejucal of the province of Mayabeque; La Lisa and Boyeros of the province of Havana and Pilón of the province of Granma. Local authorities have shared preliminary damage affecting at least 159,040 children, girls and adolescents and 24,301 teachers.

The main damages are concentrated in the following resources: roofs, lighting, furniture and school supplies, blackboards, and mattresses and bunk beds in internal institutions. In addition to the material impact, there is a perceived need for psycho-emotional support for children and adolescents in areas affected by hurricanes and earthquakes.

Priority activities of the sector

- Provide roofs (including waterproofing blankets and roof sheets) and supplies necessary for the rehabilitation of 484 schools in the 17 most affected municipalities of the 5 provinces, in coordination with the Housing and Early Recovery sector.
- Provide toilet bowls, water storage supplies (tanks and cisterns) and other means that guarantee hygienic conditions and safe sanitation in the affected schools of the 17 municipalities, in coordination with the Water, Sanitation and Hygiene sector.
- Provide kits for early childhood children in daycare centers, daycare centers and the Educate Your Child Program of the municipalities.
- Provide school supplies kits for children and adolescents in general education in the most affected municipalities.
- Provide recreation kits for the post-disaster socialemotional support of students in the schools of the most affected municipalities.
- Provide textbooks for the III Improvement of the Educational System for children, adolescents, and young people in the most affected municipalities.
- Train teachers to provide adequate education for postdisaster social-emotional care to affected children, adolescents and youth in multisectoral coordination.
- Provide teaching material kits for teachers in the most affected municipalities.
- Develop and distribute materials in multimedia format (TV, Radio and Social Security) to promote the comprehensive well-being of children and adolescents and a return to school.
- Evaluate structural risk to schools in the municipalities most affected by the earthquakes in the province of Granma.



Logistics

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Impact

Severe infrastructure damage is reported to sections of bridges, roads and paths that hinder access and communication, and the rapid distribution of aid. As a result of the influence of winds and flooded areas, damage has been identified to public service facilities such as wholesale and retail food network warehouses, food distribution centers, local retail networks, pharmacies, schools and health institutions.

The energy crisis and the fuel shortage, added to the damage to the electricity distribution network due to the impact of strong winds, have hindered response and recovery efforts.


Priority activities of the sector

- Support the delivery of tents for temporary facilities to the affected population and management positions of response operations.
- Contribute to the recovery of storage and distribution capacities, emphasizing warehouses in the most affected municipalities through mobile warehouses with pallets and lighting.

- Contribute to capacity building for energy backup of communications and other basic services in emergency situations through the use of diesel generators and solar panels.
- Strengthen logistics capabilities in the food distribution chain by purchasing tires and batteries.
- Support the provision of fuel to guarantee the transportation services associated with the response to the emergency caused by Hurricanes Oscar and Rafael, as well as by the earthquake, from the government entities in charge of the logistics of these emergency operations, as well as the operation of the United Nations System Agencies in Cuba (4000 MT).

Health

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Impact

The impacts on the health sector following Hurricanes Oscar and Rafael and the earthquakes in the eastern region include damage to infrastructure, mainly roofs, as well as loss of medical and dental equipment, medical supplies and supplies for institutions and entities. This situation makes the immediate recovery and the vitality of the services complex.

There are reports of 200 damaged health institutions. In Guantánamo 56 were identified, including the Octavio de la Concepción and Pedraza General Hospital in Baracoa, 4 polyclinics and 33 family doctors' offices.

With Hurricane Rafael, a total of 144 health institutions were damaged in the three affected provinces of the western region. These include 28 hospitals, 43 polyclinics, 123 family doctor's offices and 51 other types of clinics. In Artemisa, significant damage is reported in two hospitals, the José Ramón Martínez Pediatric Hospital in Guanajay and the Ciro Redondo García General Hospital in the municipality of Artemisa.

In addition, it is essential to provide psycho-emotional support to the affected populations after the passage of these hydrometeorological phenomena, in particular to children and adolescents.

Although no structural damage is reported in health institutions in the provinces of Granma and Santiago de Cuba, where the two earthquakes were most noticeable, the psycho-emotional impact that may have been generated in the population must be borne in mind, with emphasis on the municipalities of Pilón and Manzanillo and on children and adolescents.

Priority activities of the sector

- Provide essential equipment and supplies to support the rehabilitation of the functions of identified health units in hurricane-affected areas, including the procurement of equipment, medicines and medical health supplies, as well as inputs to build resilience to frequent multihazard events.
- Contribute to the prevention of infectious diseases and epidemiological events, including those caused by the consumption of unsafe water and poor hygiene, such as waterborne and contact diseases in health institutions.
- Contribute to the immediate rehabilitation of sexual and reproductive health services and the prevention and care of gender-based violence, including maternal health, family planning and STI/ HIV services through the acquisition of medicines for people with AIDS/HIV, contraceptives, condoms, clinical management of sexual violence, fetal monitors, ultrasound equipment, equipment and medicines for obstetric emergencies.

- Address the hygiene needs of women of reproductive age with emphasis on pregnant women, adolescents, people with disabilities, LGBTI community members and the elderly, from a gender and rights perspective.
- Strengthen the capabilities of the health system of the 7 provinces and 17 municipalities affected and the rehabilitation of the territories' essential mental health and maternal and child health services through the acquisition of critical medical equipment, drugs and supplies.
- Support the prevention of community infections and the promotion of appropriate care in the first 1000 days of life with community participation and the strengthening of psycho-emotional care with community participation.
- Contribute to the continuity of maternal and child care in the affected territories through the delivery of medicines, medical supplies and essential equipment. Support psycho-emotional care with community participation.

Food security and Nutrition

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Impact

Guantánamo province was the hardest hit by Hurricane Oscar. Serious damage was reported in the agricultural sector, in more than 4,000 hectares of vegetables, 750 hectares of bananas, and 1,117 tons of beans. In the agroforestry sector, 4,648 ha of coffee, 3,782 ha of cocoa and 153 ha of coconut were damaged. In the livestock sector, damage was reported to the roofs of facilities related to small livestock, while in the fishing sector, damage occurred to the infrastructure of fishery product processing centers. In the 4 municipalities of San Antonio del Sur, Imías, Maísi and Baracoa, 1,786 hectares of crops were lost, as well as more than 200 hectares of seedbeds that supported 2,000 hectares of sowing, which includes 27 cultivation houses in the Caujerí Valley module, and 32,800 cans of coffee. In the banana sector, it is estimated that almost 50% of the plantations have been damaged, reaching 70 or 80% in Baracoa and Maisí.

After the impact of Hurricane Rafael, in the provinces of Artemisa and Mayabeque, more than 15,000 hectares of crops such as bananas, cassava, corn, grains, vegetables, and fruits have been severely affected in the agricultural sector. There are also reports of damage to at least 10 irrigation machines and 8 crop houses. In livestock, there are significant FUNDING REQUIRED BY THE SECTOR (USD)

effects due to the loss of about 100,000 starter and layer birds, damage to the roofs of buildings in poultry farms, pigs, dairy farms and other business entities in the sector.

These losses further complicate access to food, as they constitute the supply of a large portion of the food consumed in the western part of the country, including the capital. In addition to this situation, there were severe damages in Granma province in the eastern part of the country after the earthquakes.

There are effects on the storage, cooking and conservation capacities of food in homes and institutions in the provinces of Artemisa, Mayabeque, Granma and Guantánamo, which adds to a very complex starting situation, given the national energy emergency, with effects on the water supply and the loss of stored food, aggravated by previous challenges in the stable supply of the standard family basket.

In Guantánamo, heavy flooding critically affected local food reserves, crops and livelihoods, limiting the availability and access to food, with the four most affected municipalities: San Antonio del Sur, Imías, Maisí and Baracoa. In the case of Artemisa, the municipalities of Mariel; Güira; Alquizar; Artemisa; Bahía Honda; Guanajay; San Antonio, as well as Batabanó and Quivicán in the province of Mayabeque have a higher level of impact.

Principales actividades del sector

 Provide immediate food assistance with food and cooking and consumption sets to the entire most affected population, while maintaining the delivery of the bi-monthly module of rice, grains and oil to people in vulnerable situations and pregnant women to prevent the deterioration of food and nutritional security of populations with emphasis on priority groups.



- Support the delivery of food to the most affected people and prioritized and most vulnerable groups, through social protection institutions that are functional and able to offer food services from the immediate response and during recovery (e.g. evacuation centers, community kitchens, daycare centers, primary schools, maternity homes, family care systems, homes for the elderly, grandparents' homes and other centers in the communities).
- Contribute to the prevention of micronutrient
 deficiency malnutrition with the distribution of
 nutritional supplements (micronutrient powders
 and prenatal tablets) to girls and boys aged 6
 to 59 months, as well as pregnant and lactating
 women, and support the promotion of exclusive
 breastfeeding and appropriate complementary

feeding and nutritional supplementation practices in the affected territories.

- Support the early rehabilitation of the availability of nutritious food through the local production of shortcycle crops, animal protein and eggs, for the affected population.
- Contribute to the recovery of the livelihoods of agricultural and fisheries producers, and agroforestry producers of coffee, cocoa and coconut in mountainous areas.


